WLD Fall Operating Session

It was a beautiful autumn Saturday morning [November 7th] as Ivan Ver Gowe and I drove west from Sheboygan County toward Larsen WI for a date with the Winnebago Land Division's Fall Operating Session. An hour plus trip allowed for some good model railroad conversation.



The session started at 8:30am at Randy Williamson's layout in Larsen. We had a half hour to use before knocking on Randy's door so we stopped at the local Kwik Trip for a cup of coffee and breakfast sandwich.

Randy was the morning host of the full day of operating fun. His layout is a large one; he models the Pennsylvania Railroad. Randy uses the Digitrax DCC system to power his layout's engines. Everyone gathered in the crew lounge as Randy described the layout and assigned trains. Most trains had two crew, an engineer who handles the throttle and a conductor who works the switches and uncouples the cars. The conductor also utilizes the train orders or switch lists to tell the crew what work they have to do at each town or industry. Then it was time to operate and have some fun.



There were eleven paid participants at the morning session

and a number of observers showed up as well. Most were experienced operating heads, but happily there were some newbies to operations which gives us the chance to spread the word about the fun of operations. These Fall Op Sessions are perfect for introducing operations of model railroads to the curious and interested. Billy Gabert helped Randy with the layout and questions of the operators.



At about noon the session broke up and we had an hour or so for lunch. Ivan and I opted to go into downtown Waupaca for lunch and stumbled upon "Fat Little Gretchen's" diner. It was packed, a good sign for good food and it was delicious.



We then left town and drove to Roger Hildebrandt's layout. He harbors his layout in an "A" frame house where the whole basement is filled with a double- and sometimes triple-decked layout. Roger models the Green Bay and Western. Roger, as Randy did, assigned trains to the operators and played Superintendent and all-around helper all afternoon. It is a fun railroad to operate and ran very well.

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Railroads Finding Hidden Freight Car Trackers

METUCHEN, N.J. — Railroads are uncovering hidden freight car tracking devices near rights-of-way around the country.

The discoveries began earlier this month when a Metuchen, N.J., resident found two people installing boxes near a Conrail Shared Assets Operation right-of-way. Unsatisfied with those persons' answers and the local police response, the person called Norfolk Southern railroad police who investigated and found an automatic equipment identification or AEI reader, used to track freight cars by monitoring their built-in radio beacons.

On Sept. 15, the Association of American Railroads' Railway Alert Network issued a security warning to members to keep an eye out for the unauthorized devices. *Trains NewsWire* obtained a copy of the security alert earlier this week.

According to the eight-page report, railroad police investigated further and found that a company called ClipperData had installed the reader. ClipperData was formed about two years ago and sells comprehensive data regarding the energy industry, including the movement of crude oil and other commodities. According to the report, Norfolk Southern police say they have a copy of a "lease agreement" between a homeowner near the right-of-way and ClipperData which gave the homeowner \$500 to use a nearby electrical outlet to power the equipment reader.

In an interview with *Trains News Wire*, ClipperData CEO Sterling Lapinski confirmed that his company installed the first AEI reader discovered in New Jersey. He says his company's work is legal and that ClipperData is currently looking at trying to sell data to and about the railroad industry, which is why it installed the AEI reader. Lapinski says his company sells data and information to government agencies, trading groups, and energy companies.

"We do have devices installed but the network isn't operational yet," Lapinski tells *Trains News Wire*. "We're not currently selling data, we're just trying to see if it's feasible."

Railroads around the world use similar equipment reader technology that uses radio waves to automatically identify freight cars at speed. Railroads typically gather the information to update their own records before

sharing it with other shippers, such as trucking companies, railroads, or steamship lines, and customers.

Sources close to Class I railroad corporate offices say executives are upset and are ready to take a "scorched earth" approach to dealing with ClipperData and other companies that may have installed readers throughout the country. A second security alert dated Sept. 22, says railroaders have uncovered at least one other equipment reader in New Jersey and one in Sheridan, Wyo. The one in Wyoming reportedly interfered with BNSF Railway track equipment.

The Railway Alert Network report raised concerns that the people who installed the equipment readers trespassed on railroad property to do so. It also raises concerns about selling data on the movement of specific types of rail cars, arguing that the information could be used to "disrupt rail operations through intentional, and potentially destructive, acts." The security alert asks railroads that find similar AEI readers to inform the alert network immediately so that it can consolidate all of the reports.

In a statement to *Trains News Wire*, AAR spokesperson Ed Greenberg says the organization is keeping a close eye on the developing situation. "The AAR was aware of this situation and pleased that local law enforcement and railroad police took steps to address the situation as quickly as possible," Greenberg says.

- Club was formed in 1987 and was originally located at the National Railroad Museum.
- In 2011 the club moved to its current facility located in the lower level of the Kress Library in DePere.




- The layout is constructed in a modular form but is considered permanent in many respects.
- Construction began in 2011 with some of the existing layout being moved to the new location. Several new areas were begun and continue to be worked on today. Layout is about 70% complete.
- The layout models Northeast Wisconsin from the late 70's to present.



- Key scenes on the layout include a scratch built replica of the Green Bay C&NW depot, a large farm area with all scratchbuilt structures as well as a narrow gauge area within the HO scale layout. There is also a small On30 diorama that is separate from the layout.



- The club has between 50-60 members.
- Operating sessions are held once a month from September through May.





- Club is open Thursdays from 8am till 7pm. Members are there almost anytime during the week, but no regular hours are established.

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


