## In The Hopper

This issue of In the Hopper, we will look at the operations of Joel Weeks amazing double-deck Great Northern HO layout. Prototype operations at its finest. Joel has hosted the Fox River Operating Group (FROG) many times, the WLD op day, and many other groups and friends over the years. He also hosted many open houses. The neatest one is an annual bus load of grade school kids at St. Peters Lutheran, where he works!



#### Layout Name

**GN** Willmar Division

#### **Owner**

Joel Weeks

#### **Description**

HO scale, DCC Digitrax double deck with large helix (and inside the helix is the dispatcher office).

#### **Size**

34' x 34'. Located in Joel's basement. Shelf design with several peninsulas. Construction began with a brand-new house in 2001.

#### **Theme**

Prototype Great Northern operations on the mainline St Paul to Breckinridge Minnesota in 1969.

#### **Type of Car Forwarding**

Joel uses waybill flip car cards. He made his waybills with auto cad. He took photos of each car and printed on the waybill for easy spotting. He has around 450-500 cars in inventory and around 250 are on the layout at any time for operations.

Joel color codes his spots on each waybill for easier recognition of where the car is going. Orange is East "Minneapolis Staging." Green is West "Minot Staging." And Sky Blue is "Willmar Yard" to be classified for work along the line. Note they are GN colors and works great!

Trains run in operating session/cycle:

Joel likes to run 20 trains per operating cycle. This can vary depending on how many operators are attending. He has successfully captured the feel on the GN main in 1969 across the rolling farmland and prairies of Western Minnesota. These include 4 locals each way with 3 based out of Willmar and 1 out of Breckinridge. One of these works the branch line to St. Cloud (I got to run that in March). Another new one in development is the Hutchinson local, that works that branch line.

Freight movement is king on the 1969 GN. He does run various thru freight trains from the west coast to Chicago or other way around. Usually, 4 per session. Also thrown in are transfers to SOO and CBQ in Minneapolis. You may even spot some odd cars found on the GN that he has built, like a flat hauling Boeing Airplane parts from Seattle.

And GN was still moving people in 1969. The 1969 version of Empire Builder and Western Star make their appearances and various stops with several scratch-built depots.

#### Joel's thoughts on operating

Joel has always used waybills going back to his old Willmar freelanced layout in 1991. When he moved and began this layout in 2001, he decided to make GN 1969 proto-ops a theme and created his own more prototype waybill flip cards. He chose the Willmar division as he had traveled there as a kid with his dad. He wanted wide curves, the wide-open feel of western Minnesota, and no duck-under. Also, Joel is very talented as a CAD designer which has helped him create such a cool operating layout.

Joel says that a model railroader should always be ok with adapting things to make operations more enjoyable.

## Off the Bench

In the last issue of *Off the Bench*, I mentioned that it was possible to mount the Eye Choo without its wheels on a flat car as was shown with the SQ23 security camera. At that time, the method of mounting either camera hadn't been decided upon. However, during a discussion with Irwin Nathanson of Hobby Trax US, he mentioned the possibility of using double-sided Velcro tape rather than a more complicated cradle. In addition, Nathan said using double-sided tape allowed the Eye Choo to be used with O-Scale trains.

I felt using double-sided tape was a great idea; however, the limited mounting area on the underside of the Eye Choo prevented my Velcro tape from adhering adequately.

Double-sided carpet tape, on the other hand, worked admirably. Carpet tape being scrim reinforced is very thin and adheres extremely well.


I have now run the Eye Choo on our Tuesday Morning Group mainlines. The camera has no problem videoing the entire run but breaks each video into 6-minute-long files. The flatcar mounting has eliminated the wobbling present with the original two-axle wheels. Immediately after finishing the run, the car was then plugged into the USB port of a laptop for viewing.



# **Layout Tours Philip Herman**



Phil models the BNSF's Highline sub. through Northern Montana built by the Great Northern railway. Modeling the mid 1990's just after the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe merger. The modeled portion of the line extends west from Glacier Park to the summit of Marias pass and then downgrade to the crew change point at Whitefish, MT. The HO scale layout is 35' x 21', multi deck, using digitrax controls and is fully CTC signaled, using JMRI and CATS. The Mainline run is 350'. The goal of the layout is to replicate the beautiful scenery around Glacier National Park and big-time mountain railroading and helper operations. The railroad gains 3 feet of elevation to reach the summit. The scenery is roughly 40% complete.

#### Sheboygan Railroad Museum



The Sheboygan Railroad Museum was acquired by the Society in 1993. Currently, it features a library and a large layout room featuring various model train operating setups in "G", "O", "S", "HO", "N", and "Z" gauges. The crown jewel is the large "Sheboygan and Western" two-level HO DCC layout that forms a huge dog-bone shape with a helix at the west end. This is a free-lanced layout that loosely follows a path from Chicago to Los Angeles. Digitrax provides the DCC and Train Controller the operating system; the scenery is about 75% complete. The Society owns the benchwork and scenery, while individual members provide the locomotives and rolling stock. the Society also owns a large and historic modular DCC HO-Gauge layout that has appeared in numerous places around Eastern and Central Wisconsin over the years, as well as a smaller G-Gauge modular layout.

#### **Marvin Preussler**




Marvin models the Green Bay & Western Railroad in 1990 in HO scale. Marvin's layout features NCE DCC with wireless NCE cabs. Many custom painted cars and locomotives as well as many scratch-built structures are also found on this operations-based prototype scale layout which

features over 250 freight cars. RailOp for Windows is the operating system used for operating the layout. The scenery is about 85% completed. The towns of Black Creek, Seymour, New Franken, Green Bay, and Kewaunee are featured on this layout. Photos of this layout have appeared in the Walthers catalog, the NMRA calendar, *Railmodel Journal*, and in *Model Railroader* magazine.

#### Mark Preussler



Mark models the Soo Line in the transition era from steam to diesel. This operations-based prototype HO scale layout fills his 30' X 60' basement. Towns of Waupaca, Dale, Neenah & Oshkosh are featured along with the branch line from Neenah to Manitowoc. Lots of scratch-built locos, cars, and structures can be found on this impressive layout featuring over 500 freight cars. System One DCC with NCE cabs power his layout. RailOp for Windows is the operating system used for operating this layout. An article on Mark's layout appeared in *Model Railroader* magazine. Photos of his layout also appeared in the Walthers catalog and *Railmodel Journal* magazine.



#### **Brian Wiegand**



Brian Models a portion of the Wisconsin Central Manitowoc Sub. Proto Freelanced railroad is set in the city of Menasha, WI on the Wisconsin Central Manitowoc Sub in the 1990's. The Railroad is a 19' X 18' shelf style switching layout. The layout is powered by an NCE controller and utilizes an Iowa Scaled Engineering Proto Throttle. Switch lists are generated by JMRI operations. The layout features two large paper mills, a smaller paper mill and numerous other rail-served industries found around Menasha during that time-period. Track is Micro Engineering code 83 and code 70 flex track with turnouts hand laid using fast tracks jigs. The scenery is roughly 20% complete.

## **Operating Session**

#### **Scott Payne**



Scott Payne models the CNW Alco line from Winona, MN (staging) to Brookings, ND. Circa 1970's. Scott's layout features many of the agricultural related industries along the line and interchange operations with the M&StL, Milwaukee Road and Rock Island. His operations

utilize a color-coded car card and waybill system. Mainline trains work two main yards in Mankato and Tracy Minnesota dropping off and picking up cuts of cars. Those yard masters sort cars for local industries, way freights and interchange transfer jobs. Scott has done a great job recreating these operations even down to how the work rules of each railroad affected the interchange operations. Scenery on the layout is nearly complete with lots of detail along the way. The layout operates well with 6-7 operators and is powered with NCE DCC wireless throttles.






